

## FIRST YEAR STUDENT ADVISING SHEET

### NOTES:

1. Specific entry-level course in language will be determined after results of language placement test are received. Students interested in completing a Spanish minor should speak with the Modern Language Department regarding the specific Spanish minor language level requirements.
2. Refrain from filling the Western Cultural Heritage, Non-Western Cultural Heritage or Creative Expression requirements of the Core before going abroad. This suggestion is because an International Business major could take some of the courses in these Core Areas during the study-abroad period.
3. If a student has an interest in accounting, he or she should be enrolled in the beginning accounting course (AC 101) in the first year.
4. Normally, by the junior year, a major in International Business chooses one of the following as an area of concentration: Accounting, Finance, Economics, Management, or Marketing.
5. International Students are not required to take foreign language courses for their IB major. However, students are required to take an Ancient or Modern Language to satisfy their Core – Power of Language requirement.
6. BA270 and BA271 should be taken in the 2nd year. Students should take BA270 in the fall and BA271 in the spring term.
