2017 Peace Fellow - Dr. Celia Cook-Huffman

Dr. Celia Cook-Huffman, Professor of Peace and Conflict Studies at Juniata College, will deliver two lectures as the 2017 Elizabethtown College Peace Fellow. Huffman, who has an endowed professorship in conflict resolution, is the Associate Director of the Baker Institute for Peace and Conflict Studies and Director of Baker Mediation Services. Her background combines peace studies with specialized training and education in conflict transformation, nonviolence, gender, and mediation.

In her first lecture, “Why Identity Matters,” Dr. Cook-Huffman will discuss how identity can be the marker by which in-groups and out-groups justify exclusion, violence, and genocide. At the same time, identity is an essential organizing tool for engaging and building movements for social change. By looking at how identities are shaped and constructed, we can better understand the ways we can engage identity as part of achieving social justice. This lecture will be October 17 at 7:30 pm in the Susquehanna Room, Myer Hall.

Dr. Cook-Huffman will expound upon this theme in her second lecture. As she will discuss, social identity research reveals that strategies designed to foster reconciliation may have a negative impact on in-group solidarity among minority group members and thus decrease support for social change policies. This research is important for rethinking strategies of peace building that seek to foster reconciliation and contribute to sustainable peace by creating greater justice and equity. This second lecture will be October 18 at 11:00 am in Gible Auditorium.

Dr. Cook-Huffman’s visit is sponsored by the Elizabethtown College Peace Fellowship (ECPF). Both lectures are free and open to the public; no reservations or tickets required.

That same evening, students from Dr. Katherine Hughes's graphic arts class displayed their original work based on the theme of World War I.

During the fall 2017 semester, Dr. Douglas Bomberger, Professor of Music, will present a lecture titled "American Music and the First World War" and Dr. David Kenley, Professor of History, will be presenting a lecture titled "World War I: The View from the East."

Additional activities are scheduled for 2018, including an archival exhibition, a discussion panel featuring military veterans and conscientious objectors, and a scholarly conference on Peace Churches and the Great War.

Indigenous People and the Federal Government: Celebrating American Indian Heritage Month with Rebecca Tsosie

On November 7 at 7 pm in Gible Auditorium, Rebecca Tsosie will deliver a lecture in commemoration of American Indian Heritage Month. Professor Tsosie is Regents Professor of Law at the University of Arizona and works with the Indigenous Peoples Law and Policy Program. She has extensive experience with tribal communities and currently serves as appellate judge for the Fort McDowell Yavapai Nation's Supreme Court and San Carlos Apache Tribe's Court of Appeals.

Professor Tsosie teaches in the areas of property, federal Indian law, and tribal law and policy. She is also dedicated to promoting diversity and inclusion in higher education, working collaboratively with faculty, staff, and students to advance cultural competency in the classroom and academic affairs. Tsosie's research interests include tribal self-determination within the U.S. constitutional framework, environmental justice for tribal communities, and intellectual property rights regarding cultural resources. She has previously taught courses on federal Indian law, tribal cultural resource law, bioethics, and critical race theory. She is co-author of the federal Indian law casebook *American Indian Law: Native Nations and the Federal System*. Professor Tsosie, of Yaqui descent, served as the Executive Director of the Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law Indian Legal Program from 1996-2011.



Encouraging Study Abroad

Did you know that Steve Nash, T.S. Eliot, Richard C. Blum, Vera Wang, Timothy Geithner, Dr. Seuss, and Pope Francis all studied abroad when they were students? Here at Elizabethtown College, our best and brightest students also appreciate the value of the study abroad experience. Of the 12 Fulbright scholars from Elizabethtown, every one of them participated in study abroad. Research shows that students who study abroad exhibit increased learning and higher graduation rates. The annual Elizabethtown College Senior Survey backs this up, demonstrating that study abroad and interacting directly with faculty are the most transformative experiences of students' college careers.

In spite of the evidence, the cross-cultural experience SLE has the lowest participation rate among Etown's five SLEs. The Center is committed to significantly increase this number by minimizing the barriers that inhibit students from participating in cross-cultural studies. Beginning this fall, faculty from all disciplines can apply for financial assistance in creating and leading short-term study abroad programs. Two programs will be selected for this financial support. Students enrolling in these programs will have their tuition waived. This will significantly reduce the cost and open doors for students from underrepresented groups to have an invaluable study abroad experience. The Center can provide ideas for faculty who never considered going abroad before.

The Center is also eager to promote more traditional, semester-long programs. Beginning this semester, the Study Abroad office will be located in Nicarry 117, adjacent to the CGUP offices. This will enhance synergy between the two programs, both of which are committed to internationalizing the curriculum. The college recently hired Megan

(Leppo) Bell as the new Study Abroad Advisor. As a 2014 graduate of the College, Bell earned her bachelor's degree in corporate communications and studied abroad in Cheltenham, England. For the past two years, Bell served as BCA Study Abroad's Program Advisor and Marketing Specialist. She's traveled to Czech Republic, Ecuador, Greece, Ireland, Italy, Mexico and The Netherlands. "Elizabethtown College provides excellent academic and financial support for students considering going abroad," Bell said. "You can definitely tell that the College values international education. In my role, I want to make sure students know that study abroad is an option for everyone, regardless of their major, athletic schedule, extracurriculars or finances. I want students to know that the Study Abroad Office is an advocate for them in their study abroad preparations and reentry. We can show them the benefits of studying abroad and help them overcome any anxiety or concerns. I'm energized to make sure study abroad has a presence on campus!"

Picturing Peace across Two Continents

Over the course of the 2017-2018 academic year, Elizabethtown College will be participating in a project that will span two continents and bring together artists from around the United States and Europe. Both Elizabethtown students as well as established professionals will participate in this project.
