

## **Peace and Global Scholars Program Student Guide**

The Peace and Global Scholars Program is a distinctive leadership program housed in the Center for Global Understanding and Peacebuilding that is designed to prepare students to engage as global citizens and peacebuilders to enact change and influence their communities. Over the course of their Elizabethtown career, students selected for this program work closely with a faculty advisor to design a program that includes co-curricular events and courses related to global understanding and peacebuilding.

Peace and Global Scholars are eligible to apply for up to \$2,000 per academic year to support study abroad, research, or community-based learning projects centered on the themes of internationalization or peacebuilding. Upon graduating from the program, scholars are recognized with the presentation of the Global Scholars medallion and a certificate of participation.

Each program participant will work with their faculty mentor to discuss opportunities, including a combination of curricular and co-curricular experiences, that contribute to a robust professional portfolio.

### **Peace and Global Scholars Activities and Events**

Participation in the Peace and Global Scholars program is designed to create a strong group of student leaders who serve as stewards on campus and in the community of CGUP's mission.

CGUP's mission is to empower individuals to advocate for action and engagement in ways that embrace diverse perspectives and global connectedness; challenge oppressive and violent practices, systems, and paradigms; and promote domestic and international conflict transformation, service, environmental sustainability, and respect for human dignity.

Through embodiment of the College's mission to Educate for Service, CGUP supports the promotion of peace and the commitment to the values of peace, human dignity, social justice, service, and environmental sustainability.

Stewards of CGUP's mission can use the following categories to think about how they wish to engage on campus and in the community.

#### **1. Participation**

- a. Participate in a minimum of 3 campus events per academic year

- b. Participate in organized Peace and Global Scholars' events and activities including service projects and workshops
- c. Meet with individual advisor and update individualized program plan

## **2. Building Skills**

- a. Participate in the yearly book group
- b. Serve as a mentor to an incoming scholar during junior or senior years
- c. Forage Immersion Programs on Peacebuilding
- d. Engage in building awareness and/or advocacy beyond the campus community
- e. Attend or present at a conference – opportunities are shared through the Canvas course

## **3. Advocacy and Leadership**

- a. Organize and coordinate a campus event
- b. Complete a Scholarship and Creative Arts Projects Program (SCARP) project over one summer
- c. Present at SCAD on a topic related to global issues and/or peacemaking
- d. Complete courses or facilitated experiences such as the following:
  - a. Fall course through the International Center on Nonviolent Conflict
  - b. Summer Peacebuilding Institute (scholarships available through CGUP)

### **Funding through CGUP**

#### **Applying for Funding**

Peace and Global Scholars are eligible for up to \$2,000 in scholarships to support research, community-based service projects, and/or study abroad. Scholars must be in good standing with the program and [complete the online application](#). Applications are accepted on a rolling basis.
