Student/Faculty Research Featured in New York Times and C-SPAN

The Political Science faculty at Elizabethtown College often involve students in their research projects. Students attend conferences with faculty members and even co-author papers in professional journals. This year, two of our students had their research featured in *The New York Times*. Political Science majors Jillian Casey and Julia Ward worked on the project with their faculty mentors, Dr. Fletcher McClellan and Dr. Kyle Kopko, during their senior year. Dr. Kopko also recently appeared on C-SPAN to discuss the group's research findings.

Jillian Casey and Julia Ward were both interning at the Pennsylvania Attorney General's Office during the summer and living on campus. Dr. McClellan had an idea for a research project to study the Presidential Medal of Freedom. Dr. McClellan invited Dr. Kopko and the two students to join him on the project. Together, the four coauthor a paper, titled "The Politics of the Presidential Medal of Freedom: A Fifty-Year Analysis, 1963-2013" which will be published in the *New England Journal of Political Science* in Spring 2016.

Both Casey and Ward have since graduated from Etown. They both won Fulbright awards and spent time studying abroad before attending law school at Georgetown University.

Student Interns in China

Political Science major Matthew Rucci spent the summer in Beijing, China, completing an internship with A Bridge for Children International.

Rucci lived with a host family for two months while he taught English to orphans and migrant children. According to Rucci, the experience reinforced his commitment to international issues and working abroad.

Students at Elizabethtown College have many opportunities to study and work abroad. Many students also complete internships in Harrisburg and Washington, D.C., working for government, lobbying firms, non-profit agencies, survey research firms, and think tanks.

New Master's in Public Policy

Undergraduate students at Elizabethtown College now have the option of staying a fifth year to complete a Master's in Public Policy degree.

The new MPP degree was approved by the Board of Trustees in April, 2015. The program is enrolling the first group of students in 2016-2017.

An accelerated Master's Degree

The Etown MPP degree is an accelerated degree program that allows students to begin taking graduate-level courses during their senior year of college. These courses count towards both the bachelor's degree and the Master's in Public Policy. In the summer between the fourth and fifth year, students complete an intensive summer internship. Etown's close proximity to the state capital allows students to get real world experience working in state government. Some of our students complete the Pennsylvania Legislative Fellowship, a full-time paid internship in state government. Others may choose to do a summer internship in Washington, D.C. or abroad, depending on their area of policy interest. They finish their graduate degree in their fifth year, during which they complete their graduate courses and a Master's Thesis.

Students connect with policy experts

Public policy courses at Elizabethtown College are taught by experts in the field, who bring a wealth of real-world experience to the classroom. Many of these courses also introduce students to guest speakers, including state representatives, policy makers, and lobbyists. Throughout the Master's program, students make meaningful connections with the movers and shakers that shape public policy.

Students participate in Model UN

Dr. Oya Ozkanca's Model United Nations class took part in the National Model United Nations (NMUN) Conference held in New York City, with about 2,500 students from around the world. Members of the Elizabethtown College delegation each represented a diplomat from Bosnia and Herzegovina in a different committee. Senior Political Science major, Garrett Clark, was elected to serve as the Head Delegate.

Prior to the conference, students learned about the history and organizational structure of the UN as well as the functions of all its principal organs. They also studied in detail the history, government, economics, and the foreign policy of their assigned country, Bosnia and Herzegovina. This experiential learning opportunity allowed students to gain first-hand insight into UN's decision-making procedures on a variety of topics, ranging from minority rights to disarmament.

The General Assembly plenary session and the closing ceremonies were held at the actual General Assembly Hall of the UN. During the closing ceremonies, the UN Secretary General Ban Ki-Moon addressed the NMUN participants, talking about the important items on the agenda of the UN as well as the educational value of the Model UN experience in getting vital discussions started.
