21. Technology Tools for Student Engagement and Digital Citizenship Linda Macaulay (Instructional Technology Services)

As we engage our students and prepare them for 21st century teaching and learning, we often use technology tools. While instant access to technology for learning via cell phones, tablets, laptops and the internet holds much promise, there is also a sense of urgency to ensure our students are equipped with digital literacy/citizenship skills to remain safe. This session will explore technology tools available at Etown to engage students in meaningful learning and explore ways we as faculty can ensure that our students also learn the digital citizenship skills they need to be safe technology-enhanced learners. Some of the tools to be shared include Turnitin, Office 365, and library resources. There will be time for participants to consider ways to implement these ideas and tools into an existing course.

Learning Outcome(s): Participants will be able to: 1. List and use tools that can be integrated into the Canvas LMS to promote more engaged and informed learning. 2. Login to Office 365 to create and share a document where students can work collaboratively on the same document. 3. Examine and use resources available through the High Library to encourage critical evaluation of resources for teaching and learning. 4. Explain and apply digital citizenship skills that are needed when working with technology tools for teaching and learning. 5. Incorporate technology tools into an existing course to improve student engagement and promote digital citizenship skills.
