What is the Susquehanna Valley Ministry Center?

The Susquehanna Valley Ministry Center (SVMC) equips leaders for ministry in a Christ-centered, culturally relevant context that bears witness to the beliefs, heritage, and practices of the Church of the Brethren. SVMC partners with districts and the denomination to train and educate those called to ministry as clergy or lay leaders through the Academy Certified Training System (ACTS) and continuing education events. We also support congregations in planting God's kingdom seeds in their communities and beyond.

What is SVMC Sunday?

To support SVMC's mission and to encourage a culture of calling, congregations are encouraged to have an SVMC Sunday in 2026. Although you may choose any date that suits your congregation, a few meaningful possibilities are:

- April 26th (the Sunday before the Spring SVMC Governing Board meeting),
- May 24 (the Sunday after the last class for the 2025-2026 ACTS Academic Year),
- Any Sunday in August, before the new ACTS Academic Year begins, or
- November 8 (the Sunday before the Fall SVMC Governing Board meeting).

This service would fulfill three purposes: 1) to encourage a culture of calling out gifts for ministry, 2) to raise awareness about how SVMC is a resource for ministry, and 3) to allow congregations to support SVMC financially. Below are worship resources for a worship service on this year's theme and scripture:

Theme: Plant mustard seeds of faith and giving, and see how they grow!

Scripture: Matthew 13:31-32

SVMC encourages you to accompany this worship service with a time of discernment: Are there individuals in your congregation who may have gifts for ministry? You may also use this worship as an opportunity to pray for those who are currently in ministry training, instructors who teach, and district leadership who support students in their journey. Additionally, please consider taking up a special offering for the work of SVMC as your partner in ministry training.

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What is the theme of SVMC Sunday?

Scripture Commentary - Audrey Hollenberg-Duffey, Director of SVMC, Oakton Church of the Brethren

At the beginning of Jesus' ministry, he tells all those who will hear, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is near" (Matthew 4:17). As he preaches, teaches, and heals, he shows the world what this new kingdom looks like. And yet, some still struggle to see it coming and how it is already taking shape. So, Jesus sets out to explain the kingdom through a series of parables. The kingdom of heaven is like:

- ...good seed planted in a field (Matt 13:24)
- ...a mustard seed (Matt 13:31)
- ...yeast (Matt 13:33)
- ...treasure (Matt 13:44)
- ...a precious pearl (Matt 13:44)
- ...a net full of fish (Matt 13:47)

Through these parables, Jesus hopes we will gain insight and wisdom about God's kingdom through the lens of something familiar: planting, cooking, treasure, and fishing. And yet, in each of these parables, something extraordinary happens in response to something quite ordinary.

In both Luke's and Matthew's gospels, the mustard seed parable is paired with the parable of the yeast. In these short stories, something that begins quite small grows into something amazingly large. Even though much of the growth process happens outside of our observation, what we can see is the outcome and the impact. So it is with the kingdom. Seeds are planted that grow exponentially because God is in them. Much of God's kingdom grows out of our sight, and certainly outside of our control. However, we have a responsibility to plant seeds and then let God do the rest.

What seeds for the kingdom of heaven are you called to plant in your church, in your community, in the world? Are there individuals in your congregation who have the gifts for ministry? How might you call out, support, and encourage their calling? Is God calling your congregation to serve others in a particular way? How might you plant seeds of God's kingdom that God might grow and multiply? How might your congregation be a place where all sorts of people can gather and be nurtured?

Plant mustard seeds of faith and giving and see how they grow!

Invitation to Give – *Brandy Liepelt, Annville Church of the Brethren*

We are invited to join God in the work of planting seeds. We are invited to share the fruits of the seeds God has planted and nurtured in this place; the fruits of generosity, community, love, service, joy...

Psalm 97:11-12 in the Message says, “Light seeds are planted in the souls of God’s people, Joy seeds are planted in good heart-soil. So, God’s people, shout praise to God, give thanks to our Holy God!” May our giving be an extension of our praise for all that God has given and planted within us. May we graciously share the seeds God has given to us.

Offertory Prayer – *Brandy Liepelt, Annville Church of the Brethren*

Lord God, we give back to you only a small portion of what you have given to us. Receive these fruits we bring and use them to increase the harvest. Use these gifts and offerings to scatter your seeds of faith, hope, mercy, love, and justice both far and wide. In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Prayers for Planting – *Brandy Liepelt, Annville Church of the Brethren*

Prayer Practice: Have a packet of seeds (i.e. A Spring Garden Mix) distributed to each person.

Gather in small groups with those near you in the sanctuary. Name those who planted seeds of faith in your life. Name those who planted seeds for the various ministries in your congregation. Take a few moments to pray as a group, thanking God for those willing to sow seeds and those who nurture seeds. Ask God to help you identify seeds you can sow and how you can nurture what God is doing in those around you.

Prayer of Confession – Brandy Liepelt, Annville Church of the Brethren

Holy Lord and Master Gardener, we confess we often lack the patience to tend to the seeds planted within us and others. We confess we overlook the small and the behind-the-scenes work of your hand. We confess that we'd rather delight in large trees and in shade than nurture the process. Help us, Lord, to see with your eyes, to listen with your ears, to nurture with your hands, and with your voice to call out the gifts we see for ministry in ourselves and in others.

Assurance of Pardon: Jesus assures us that our God of gracious abundance scatters seed far and wide, and even the smallest of seeds has the potential to grow exponentially. The Lord is careful and faithful with the smallest of seeds. You can trust the Lord to be faithful and careful with you as well.
