Etown Launches New Medical Laboratory Science Major

Starting in the fall of 2025, Elizabethtown College will offer students multiple pathways to prepare for a fulfilling career in the healthcare field through its new Medical Laboratory Science major. Students will have two pathways that allow them hands-on laboratory experience with interdisciplinary chemistry, biochemistry, and biology coursework. With the 3+1 option, students complete three years of coursework at Etown, followed by a year of specialized clinical training at an accredited medical laboratory science program, preparing them to sit for the American Society for Clinical Pathology Board of Certification Exam to work as certified medical laboratory scientists. Students can also choose the traditional four-year bachelor's degree program with its strong foundation in laboratory sciences, which prepares them for clinical training programs or many career pathways.



- On December 13, **Ryan Kraychik '27** (Biology Pre-Med) was awarded a Congressional Award, the highest civilian honor given by the United States, for his more than 400 hours of community service. Congressman Brian Fitzpatrick (PA-1) presented Kraychick with the honor during Pennsylvania's First District 2024 Congressional Award Ceremony. Kraychik was inspired to help Ukrainian children affected by school closures because of the war. He founded an online English tutoring program for children and served as a tutor, demonstrating the power of education as a source of stability and hope even in the most challenging circumstances.
- Mia Cudmore '25 (Biology Health Professions) presented her research with **Dr. Debra Wohl** at the annual regional meeting of Tri Beta, National Biology Honors Society. Cudmore's award-winning presentation was titled "Studying the importance of gut microbiota on Caenorhabditis elegans (C. elegans) physiology."
- Sanya Dedhia '28 (Biology Health Professions) was honored with this year's Anna Carper Excellence in Library Research Award for her presentation, "Botulinum Neurotoxin: From Disease to Drug." Dhriti Shah '28 (Biology Health Professions) was awarded an honorable mention for her presentation, "The Duality of Ketamine."
- Three Elizabethtown College students presented their research at the annual meeting of the Mid-Atlantic Chapter of the Ecological Society of America. Amanda Kauffman '25 (Biology) gave an oral presentation of their research with Dr. Robert Northington, titled Comparing stream condition indices in restored and unrestored sections of Conoy Creek in Elizabethtown, PA.



Angelymarie Pacheco '26 (Environmental Science) and Makenzi Reed '26 (Environmental Science) had a poster presentation titled, The effects of floodplain restoration on reptiles and amphibians.

Avonlea Lechleitner '27 (Biotechnology), Julia Ivery '27 (Biology Health Professions), and Ahsa Sadhukhan
 '25 (Biology Health Professions) received distinguished student awards at the Elizabethtown College 2024-2025 Student Awards Ceremony.

- Caitlyn Jensen '26 was awarded a Pennsylvania Academy of Science Undergraduate and Graduate
 Research Grant and the Basic Science Institute (BSI) at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, Neuro
 Summer Internship. In addition, Jensen received a fellowship to attend the Catalyzing Advocacy in Science
 and Engineering Workshop offered by the American Association for the Advancement of Science in
 Washington, D.C.
- Dr. Robert Northington submitted three grants to the National Foundation, totaling over \$3 million. Dr.
 Northington also published three papers, including one in the journal "Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences" (PNAS), titled <u>Abrupt transformation of West Greenland lakes</u>.

Goldina ran a workshop on interview tactics for medical admissions. Kuhn, Sadhukhan, and Goldina also presented an elementary anatomy lesson to Elizabethtown Area third graders.


Elizabethtown College Hosts Second Annual High School Chem-a-Thon

n April 4, the Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry welcomed 48 local high school students to the second annual Chem-a-Thon. The day began with an engaging, hands-on laboratory experience in state-of-the-art chemistry laboratories, which were renovated in 2023. The high schoolers worked with Etown faculty and students, using college-level techniques to complete a chemistry experiment. Students also participated in a chemistry-based quiz bowl that showcased their knowledge, with a chance to win prizes, including a scholarship for each member of the winning team if they decide to enroll at Etown. This year, Fenner Precision Polymers was the event's corporate sponsor.

Samantha Small '26 attended the American Chemical Society (ACS) Leadership Institute. Small was one of
15 student chapter leaders from more than 200 applications and had the opportunity to network with other
peer leaders from student ACS chapters and speak with 14 board members of the ACS. In addition to her
networking experiences, Small attended presentations hosted by the Younger Chemists Committee and
workshops about professional networking, engaging and motivating volunteers, and accessing ACS
resources for student chapters.

 Intercollegiate Student Chemists Convention at Muhlenberg College. Honorable mentions were awarded to

 Nanoparticle-Based Lateral Flow Assay for Detection of Hg2+ in

Berger's presentation, "Heavy Metals, Heavy Breathing: The Effects of Cadmium Chloride on Protein Kinase Signaling in Lung Epithelial Cells," built off the work she performed with Defnet and Caszatt during the 2024 Summer Creative Arts and Research Program (SCARP). Caszatt's poster presentation, "The Effects of T2 Antigen on Thyroid Receptor Activity," was in collaboration with Dr. Jane Cavender. Caszatt has been developing her project during the spring 2025 semester and plans to complete an honors thesis project on her research in 2026. Defnet presented her poster, "Mechanistic Study of Estrogen-Induced Exacerbation of Asthma Through the MAPK Pathway," at the poster session and was also selected as a recipient of an Undergraduate Faculty Travel Award for the conference.
- Isaac Kraenbring '25, Samantha Small '26, and Ryan Smith '25 submitted abstracts and were selected to present research at the prestigious 2025 National Conference on Undergraduate Research (NCUR), held April 7-9 in Pittsburgh, PA. Dean Alan Utter and Dr. Jeffrey Rood accompanied the students. This was the first time Etown has engaged in this national meeting.
- At the Elizabethtown College 2024-2025 Student Awards Ceremony, Isaac Kraenbring '25 received the
 Distinguished Mentor Student Award, while Dr. Desmond Yengi was honored with the Distinguished
 Mentor Faculty Award.
- The Etown Rho Eta chapter of Gamma Sigma Epsilon, the national chemistry honors society, inducted eight new members in March: Isabell Anderson '26, Callie Asper '26, Emma Caszatt '26, Lillian Hoover '26, Matthew Lamb '25, Samantha Small '26, Cameron Snelbaker '26, and Zain Wegman '25.



- Samantha Small '26 (Biochemistry and Molecular Biology) was recently named a 2025 Barry Goldwater Scholar by The Barry Goldwater Scholarship and Excellence in Education Foundation and the United States Department of Defense National Defense Education Program. Small is Etown's seventh Goldwater Scholar, with a Blue Jay last receiving the prestigious distinction in 2023. Considered one of the country's preeminent undergraduate scholarship awards in natural sciences, mathematics, and engineering, the Goldwater Scholarship was designed to foster and encourage outstanding students to pursue research careers in these fields.
- **Isabell Anderson '26** received a fellowship to attend the 2026 American Chemical Society Conference in Atlanta, Georgia.
- **Dr. Kristi Kneas** and Chairman **Dr. Jeffrey Rood** developed a new program in Medical Laboratory Sciences, which will be launched in Fall 2025. As an interdisciplinary program between the Chemistry and Biology Departments, a 3+1 option allows students to complete three years of coursework at Etown, followed by a year of specialized clinical training at an accredited medical laboratory science program, preparing them to sit for the American Society for

Clinical Pathology Board of Certification Exam to work as certified medical laboratory scientists. Students can also choose the traditional four-year bachelor's degree program that provides a strong foundation in laboratory sciences, preparing them to enter clinical training programs or pursue several career pathways.

 Dr. James MacKay received a grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF) to continue his research, Nucleobase-Modified PNA for Sequence Selective Triple-Helical Recognition of Non-Coding RNA. The grant was awarded in conjunction with Dr. Eriks Rozners, Binghamton University in New York, and is the third grant they have received related to this project, which studies new methods for molecular recognition of biologically



significant non-coding ribonucleic acid (RNA) and uses chemistry to understand non-coding RNA in biological processes. The grant will continue until 2027. In the summer, MacKay took ten students to a three-day workshop, sponsored by the National Science Foundation, that allowed both Etown and Binghamton students to learn about this collaborative project and gain valuable exposure to graduate-level research.

- Dr. Lauren Toote organized the chemistry seminar course and hosted Carsten Milsmann from the
 Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry at the University of Delaware and
 Matthew C. T. Hartman from the Department of Chemistry at Virginia
 Commonwealth University for research presentations.
- On September 28, the Chemistry and Biochemistry Department presented Mary
 J. Harner, Ph.D. '06 with the Oscar F. Stambaugh Outstanding Alumni Award. The
 Stambaugh Award is presented to a graduate of Etown who has made
 distinguished professional contributions in chemistry or medicine. Dr. Harner is
 currently the Director of Global Oncology Medical Affairs at Daiichi Sankyo.
